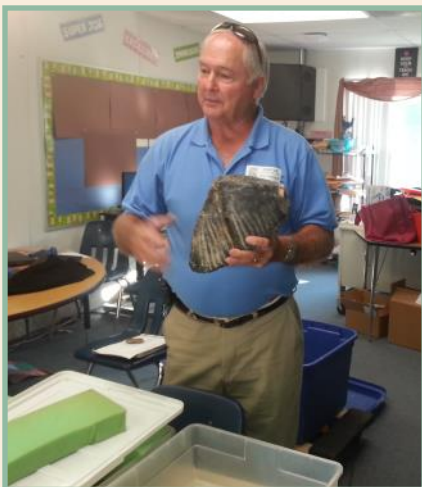

As a former teacher, the most exciting museum outreach programs for me have been at the local schools. Seeing the fascination and surprise in the faces of young children as they make discoveries supports the value of our Museum. Viewing a variety of primary sources that include photographs, letters, oral history, newspapers, maps and census forms, students have learned to interpret and evaluate the importance of these documents while demonstrating their newfound knowledge as they make their very own presentations. How amazing for them to discover that life existed before computers, video games and cell phones! Upon viewing an early photo of the Curry family, one student at Englewood Elementary School said, "My friend has that photo in his house. His last name is Curry!"

With the wonderful support of **Dean Calamaras**, students at **Garden Elementary School** have learned that marine and animal life reigned galore in this area during the Miocene and Pleistocene periods. Dean presented an amazing array of fossils from mammoths, mastodons, Megalodons, many shark teeth and whale vertebrae from local sites, including Venice Beach, Taylor Ranch and even Center Road. The students were in awe. It has been an eye-opening experience for me as I observe the talent of our young students plus the invaluable knowledge from our museum volunteers. I am proud to be a part of this unique organization.

A Message from Larry Humes Annual VHI Meeting a Time for Celebration

There was nothing to fear of this Ides of March for the weather was perfect and the mood jubilant as dozens gathered for Venice Heritage's annual meeting and to celebrate the progress made to the Lord-Higel House.

VHI's outgoing president, **Jean Trammell**, welcomed the audience and cited the restoration work that has been done thus far to the 119-year-old building. After members voted to approve the Minutes of last year's meeting as well as to accept the Treasurer's report, Trammel gave thanks to those members rotating off the board, **John Moore** and **Barbara Dein**. She also paid homage to **David Sherman** who died at the beginning of the year. She spoke not only of Dave's many contributions to VHI and historic preservation, but also his passion for the community at large. "He truly loved this community," she said, and he will be sorely missed.

Trammell introduced the incoming officers of the organization: **Larry Humes**, president; **Judith Ann Keeler**, vice president; **Susan Hanks**, treasurer, and **Sue Vedder**, secretary. Before handing over the gavel, however, she took the opportunity to present VHI's first annual Community Service Award to **Dorothy Korwek** for her many years of outstanding volunteer service as the organization's office manager.

Humes thanked **Trammell** for her leadership as a founding member and president of VHI since its inception three years ago. "The more I have had the opportunity to work with Jean, the more I have come to appreciate and admire her wisdom and experience," he said. "She may be stepping down as president, but I still have her on speed dial and know that I will be counting on her for advice in the future."

Humes then called **Jack and Judie Bauer** to the porch for a special presentation. “As we thought about ways we might honor your many years of service to this community, it seemed a plaque just wasn’t enough,” he said. “We wanted something that would remind citizens of your generosity each and every time they walk by this historic house.” The Bauers then removed the cover to a rocking chair that bears their name and will eventually find a place of honor on the porch. Jack has been instrumental in the Lord-Higel House’s restoration. And among her many other contributions, Judie serves on the City’s Historic Preservation Board.

Local architect **Jon Barrick** was introduced to the audience as the newest member of the LHI team. A graduate of the University of Florida and someone passionate about historic preservation (he and his wife restored one of Venice’s original homes), Jon has agreed to serve on the committee overseeing the house’s complete restoration. In addition to his role with VHI, Jon also serves on the City’s Architectural Review Board.

And finally, author

Jack Mersereau spoke to the audience for a few minutes, sharing anecdotes from his recently-published book about the history of the Venice Fire Department.

Following the meeting, visitors were invited to walk around the house and peek inside. Volunteer **Earl Midlam** was

also on hand with Old Betsy and provided lots of information about its history as the City’s first fire engine. **Humes** said VHI is currently finalizing plans with the City of Venice, which owns the Lord-Higel House, about its eventual use. Work is expected to begin soon on completing restoration of the building’s interior.

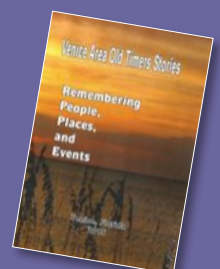
Museum gift shop
